Best has followed Stapleton throughout her school career and has opened her classroom for observation hours.

"Even when she was in third grade, I would tell her, 'You are going to be the best teacher someday. One day, you might be just right across the hall,' " Best said. "Now this dream is so close."

Stapleton plans to attend the Elizabethtown campus of Western Kentucky University. The university will pay for a third of her tuition, and Hardin County Schools also will pay a third.

"I'm just left owing a third because they're in such need of teachers in our surrounding counties and Hardin County," Stapleton said.

Stapleton said it's her love for children and her desire to facilitate positive change that motivates her to teach.

"I've always had a heart for kids," Stapleton said. "I've always wanted to be the one to make an influence in the world, especially in the world we live in today, I feel we need influences for the younger generation."

Pastor of The Grove, Eric Oliver, also appreciates Stapleton’s service and the example she sets to others.
