Marilyn is a Regional Representative for the Helen Keller National Center (HKNC). When speaking with Marilyn, she spoke about three key tips to remember when interacting or communicating with people who are Deaf-Blind. First, always remember that people are not the same. Deafness and blindness vary in different degrees of complete

deafness/blindness to partial deafness/blindness. Second, remember to take things slow and be patient. Be willing to repeat yourself as many times as they ask. Lastly, and most importantly, be willing to communicate. The more willingness you have, the better you will interact with them because of the positivity you're portraying. All of

the participants who attended were able to understand these tips and many of them will be attending the Deaf-Blind Retreat in April to visit with the Deaf-Blind community. Everyone here at the WKU ASLS program and the ASL Organization would like to thank the HKNC and Marilyn for spending their time educating us. We hope to see you again soon!
