Course Description

The Rehabilitative Audiology course provides the graduate level experience necessary for understanding the methodology, procedures, application of strategies and technology utilized for assisting deaf and hearing impaired children and adults.

This course will provide you with content concerning hearing assessment, hearing disorders, and management strategies for the hearing impaired across the lifespan. Students will be exposed to terminology and concepts relevant to the professions of communication disorders.

Topics for this semester will include:

- 1. Anatomy & Physiology
- 2. Audiological Assessment
- 3. Consequences of hearing impairment
- 4. Technology for the hearing impaired
- 5. Language and speech of the hearing impaired

- 6. Aural Rehabilitation model, settings, service delivery
- 7. Psychosocial and educational aspects of hearing loss
- 8. Hearing Loss Prevention
- 9. Hearing disorders
- 10. Aural rehabilitation resources and tools

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the successful student shall:

- 1. Understand the etiology and symptoms of various hearing impairments affecting children and adults.
- 2. Define terminology and methodology for conducting hearing screenings and assessments.
- 3. Implement aural rehabilitative strategies, therapy methods, and practices mandated by ASHA for individuals who experience communication disorders relating to hearing impairment.
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of technologies utilized for various hearing impairments.
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding and application of terms and concepts concerning aural rehabilitation.
- 6. Identify differing service models and settings.
- 7. Demonstrate the ability to analyze assessment results and develop appropriate management strategies.
