Resource Conservation manages Western's recycling, composting, waste reduction and surplus efforts; but we are best known as "The Recycling People". Recycling is a huge part of WKU's sustainability goals, but it is up to the students, faculty and staff to attain this goal. As a recycling representative, you are helping educate the campus on what and how much is recyclable.

As a recycling representative, make sure to offer as much information as possible regarding recycling practices, including why an item is or isn't recyclable. We want our campus community to develop a deeper understanding of waste disposal. Recycling can be confusing, so thank you for delivering clarification and enthusiasum to WKU!

WKU has recycling partnerships with Southern Recycling, C&I Electronics, Staples, Parish Recycling and QRS.

Our current recycling rate is 23%, but our goal is 35% by 2020!

Zipblock bag

 QRS, WKU's recycling collector, specializes in unusual plastics. On campus, we can accept clean, clear plastic bags

Ink Cartridges

Paper Cup

• QRS can accept paper cups

Electronic waste

 Discarded or unneeded electronics must be electronically recycled separately.
 They can be brought to the 2nd floor of the supply services to be recycled

Paper Bag

• Clean Paper bags can be recycled

Napkins and Paper Towels

 Napkins and Paper Towels are any "end of life" paper product, so they are too weak to be recycled.

Laminated Paper

 Laminated paper is considered a blended material since the paper and plastic cannot be separated.

Granola bar wrapper

 Chip bags are considered a blended material, so they must be placed in the trash.

Straws

 Straws are too small and too weak of a material to be recycled

Plastic Fork

Forks are too small to be recycled

Styrofoam cup

 Styrofoam can only be recycled in select cities on the west coast.

Grocery Bag

 Walmart bags are an end of life plastic product, to our recycling collector cannot accept them.
 However they can be returned to the store for recycling.
