Occupation Outlook

The field of social work



- As of 2020, 713,200 social workers nationally
 - 342,500 child, family, and school social workers
 - 185,000 healthcare social workers
 - 123,200 mental health and substance abuse social workers
 - 62,500 social workers in other fields

- Expected growth of 13% through 2029, which is above the average for all occupation
 - Only 4% for all other occupations

Occupation Outlook

Child, family, and school social worker



Provide assistance to improve the functioning of children & their families. May assist single parents, arrange adoptions, find foster homes for abandoned or abused children. In schools, they address such problems as teenage pregnancy, misbehavior, & truancy. May also advise teachers.

Average Annual Salary $\rightarrow $40,994$ Experienced Annual Salary $\rightarrow $56,226$



Occupation Outlook

Health care social worker

Provide individuals, families, & groups w/ psychosocial support needed to cope with chronic, acute, or terminal illness. Services include advising family caregivers, provide patients with information, counseling, and make referrals for other services. May also provide case and care management or interventions designed to promote health, prevent disease, and address barriers to access to healthcare.

Average Annual Salary $\rightarrow $49,910$ Experienced Annual Salary $\rightarrow $65,599$

Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) program

- Since 1974, accredited 1978
- Currently >200 SWRK majors/minors; BSW @ Bowling Green, Elizabethtown/Fort Knox, Owensboro, and Online (starting in Fall 2021!)

Master of Social Work (MSW) program

- Since 2004
- Full-time, Part-Time, Advanced Standing,
 Online (get your Master's degree in 8 months!)

Courses

- Cultural competence

Fall and Spring Admissions

- Fall: 4 semesters to complete
- Spring: 5 semesters to complete



- 400-hour **internship** in 3rd and 4th semesters
 - At local agency in area of interest
 - Under supervision of professional social worker

Prerequisites for SWRK Major

- ✓ SWRK 101 (must pass with a "C")
- ✓ ENG 100
- ✓ STATISTICS (SOCL 300, MATH 183, or in another discipline; or can take SWRK 344 [Summer Only]; or STA 220 from KCTCS) (required no later than the end of the first semester following admission to the program)
- ✓ BIO 113 or 120 or 131
- ✓ PSY or PSYS 100/220 and SOCL 100/AGRI 108*
- ✓ PS 110 AND ECON 150/202/203*

*One for admission; **BOTH** are required no later than the end of the first semester following admission to the program

Admission Criteria and Process

- Attain sophomore standing at time of admission
- Completion of prerequisites (see previous slide)
- ✓ GPA 2.5 or higher
- Write a personal/Professional Statement
- ✓ Complete application

- ✓ Sign off on NASW Code of Ethics agreement
- ✓ Sign off on BSW Student Handbook agreement
- ✓ Submit application online by deadline:
 - ✓ Spring: November 1st
 - ✓ Fall: April 1st
- ✓ BSW Program may request an interview

Tuition Rates

2022-2023 estimates

- On campus = \$5,556 per semesteror \$11,112 per AY*
- Online = Students enrolled exclusively in distance learning courses will be assessed the distance learning per hour rate (\$551/hour) regardless of the number of hours enrolled.

Public Child Welfare Certification Program (PCWCP)

Benefits

- Up to four semesters of tuition (in-state rate)
- Stipend for four semesters
- Employment with DCBS upon completion of the BSW and PCWCP (consistent with state personnel requirements)

Obligations

- Enter into a contractual agreement with the Cabinet for Health & Family Services
- List 10 counties in which you are willing to intern/become employed
- Apply for employment within specified time frame

Paid Internship!


Benefits*:

- May lead to full time job

Must be:

- Enrolled full-time
- In good standing
- GPA >= 2.50
- Sponsored by BSW program

*No obligation to work for DCBS after graduation; can also complete Co-Op Intern Program while in an MSW program in Kentucky
